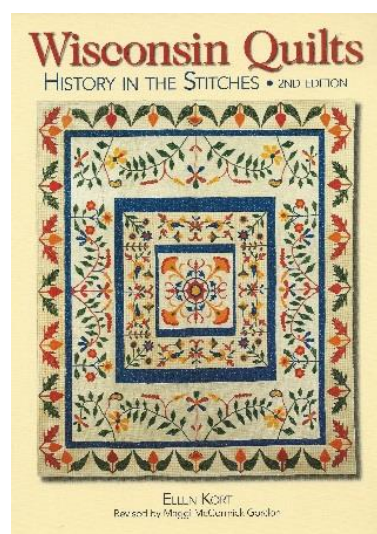

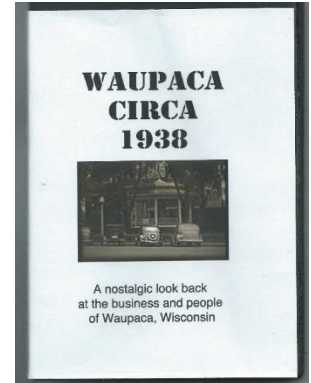
After acknowledgements, a preface, and an introduction, this remarkable document takes us through Chapter 1, Settlement to Statehood, 1848; Chapter 2, Statehood through the Civil War, 1848-1865; Chapter 3, Urbanization and Industrialization, 1865-1885; Chapter 4, New Lifestyles, 1875-1900; Chapter 5, Progressivism 1900-1929; and Chapter 6, The Great Depression to the End of World War II, 1930-1950. An Epilogue, Patterns, Notes, a bibliography, and an index follow.

Featured are exquisite colored photos and pattern make-ups of quilts from the eras plus the wonderful stories behind them, the women who created them and the messages put into them, documenting history of the era.

As of Jerry Chappell's April 2014 review, this 76 year old silent black and white, nicely edited, motion picture movie (mostly scenes out front of stores on the street) is about select retail establishments around 1938 and the people that own and staff them and/or are their customers. The images of summertime buildings, people, and action are somewhat grainy but discernable. Scripting and casting for the movie's unknown cameraman and producer seems like it follows a newspaper ad, "Note - We are going to make a movie about some of Waupaca's stores and people. We will let the proprietors and the public know when and where we will be filming through and around downtown Waupaca with our camera. Be there and you can be in the film." A brochure compiled by Mike Kirk accompanies this film to name most of the stores and buildings and many of the people.



With jazzy music in the background, movie clip one starts with views of the sign for and grounds of the **Waupaca Conservation Club** on the Crystal River, moves to **the Laux Brothers Waupaca Chevrolet Motor Sales** (108 East Union Street and buildings around it) for a scene of someone pumping gas into a new vehicle, moves on to view Al Kreeger giving a shave in **Kreeger's Barber Shop** (108 E. Union Street). About 50 happy people are included in street group and individual scenes with a brochure that accompanies the film naming about 22 of those persons). Clip one continues with staff, customers, and action around **Leader's Hardware Store** (9 people); moves to show Sam and Tom Godfrey of the **Charles J. Miller Realty Company** visiting and selling a house; then covers staff, equipment, and action around the **International Harvester Company** (East end of Fulton Street), **Kroger Grocery**, and **Kruenen Implement and Welding Company**.

Clip two of this late 1930s cultural period (dress, clothing, vehicles, etc.) captures street views of dozens of employers, employees, and customers (and often inside equipment and products ) in front of **Waupaca Fruit and Meat Store** (17 people, 102 North Main Street, N. E. Corner of Main and Fulton), **Behnkee Volunteer Store**, **Dodge-Plymouth Dealership**, **Billard (and Beer) Hall**, **Delevan Hotel** (and restaurant with dining room), **Northwestern Produce Company** (showing many products), **Simpson's Restaurant** (air conditioned 222.S. Main Street), **Glover Farm Store**(with home delivery sequence), **Economy Food Market**, **Community Co-op and Oil Company**, and the **Mortonsen and Fabicius Meat Market**. A segment of the movie looks like a "Downtown Saturday afternoon' with the city benches full of people.

Clip three offers a ladies group touring the lawns of the Commandant's Home of the Grand Army Home on Rainbow Lake; visits the loading of a truck at the **Fuller Goodman Company** (fuel and lumber, corner of Oborn and Ware Street); enjoys a mob of kids engulfing ice cream cones in front of **Christoph's Dairy** with owners and employees looking on (110 W. Fulton Street); shows **Boy Scout Troop 34** (with their headquarters building and a drill); and explores the **Pioneer Hardware Store** (products and delivery truck, N.E. end of Main and Fulton). Next film viewers visit **The Farmers State Bank** (officers and employees at 100 S. Main Street/SW corner of Main and Fulton); meet the owners, working staff, and products of **Schultz Brothers Company** (9 people), and circle around the busy street in front of **Hoffman Optometrist** (11 people, 112 South Main Street). Nicely alert on the job, the cameraman never misses a pretty lady – or was it the film editor?

Clip four quickly focuses on **Emmanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church** (west end of Badger Street), **The Armory** (120 S. Washington Street), **Waupaca Hospital and Clinics** (with Dr. Marshall Boudrey and Dr. L. G.

Patterson, 109 Lake Street), **City Hospital** ( N.E. corner Lake and Division, Dr. Sam and Isabelle Salan), and Father Schoetll with his large congregation leaving after the service at **St. Mary Magdoline's Catholic Church**. Clip four continues with views of the **Waupaca High School, Waupaca Country Club, Wisconsin's Veterans Home**, and the **Chain 'O Lakes**. Mixing buildings and congregations leaving after church service, the cameraman has a Sunday morning visit to **St. Mark's Episcopal** (Father Beauford Marciel, 415.Main Street), **Holy Ghost** (N. E. corner Maple & Waupaca Street), **Our Saviors Lutheran Church** (corner of Division and Badger Street) **First United Methodist** (315. S. Main Street on E side of Main, S of Badger). Many of Waupaca's steadfast parish population, are filmed leaving church on Sunday morning.

Clip five returns to Waupaca businesses, rounds up all the owners, workers, and customers, and includes **Waupaca Abstract and Loan, Gamble Stores** (202 S. Main, Southwest corner of Main and Union St.), **The Fair Department Store** (Main Street middle of court house block), **City Hall and Fire Station** (with fire trucks and firemen charging out at the east side, north end of Main Street), **Hansen's Bar** (115 West Fulton Street), and **Waupaca Candy Kitchen** (yum – yum displays at 111. N. Main Street, west side). Next, there is a gang of men at the Grand View Hotel, including the tallest man in the world, Cliff Thompson. In turn there is video coverage of people acting around **Stratton Drugs** (107 N. Main Street, west side), **Normington's Dry Cleaning** (delivery sequence from N. Main Street), **Brammel Furniture Store** (delivery sequence from 121 N. Main Street, S.W. corner of Main And Sessions Street), **Grey Czeskleba Oil Co. – Pull-up Phillips '66'**, (pumping gas and moving oil at N. side of Mill Street at State Street), **Haebig's Clothing Store** (113 N. Main Street), **Hartman's Bakery** (with 'Mity-nice' products at 208 S. Main Street), and **Campbell's** (108 S. Main Street).

Video clip six allows us to visit, with loads of people milling around, the following stores in operation: **D & M Beauty Shop** (203 N. Main Street), **Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company** (N. W. Corner of Main and Fulton Street), **McLean's Food Store** (W. side of Main Street in court house block), **Waupaca Public Service Company Office** (201 Main Street), **Faultless Dry Cleaners** (delivery sequence at 219 N. Main Street), **Dr. Robert L. Orrick Chiropractor** (examining and treating a boy), **First National Bank** (with a banking negotiation at 122 S. Main Street, corner of Main and Union Street), **Waupaca Seed Company** (delivering sequence at N side of Union Street), **Budding and White Pool Hall** (118 S. Main Street), **Nick's Place** (S side of Union Street), **Electric Light and Power** (appliances at N. W. corner of Main and Session Street), **Anne of Green Gables Tea Room** (S. Franklin Street), **Waupaca Co-op Creamery** (138 Oborn Street), **Holly Funeral Home** (with hearse at 526 S. Main Street, corner of Main and Lake Street), and **Cary Manufacturing Company** (Churchill Street),

Final video clip seven visits the **Band Stand, South Park** (kick ball and swimming), peeks into an animal show, and follows a long car funeral procession (and cemetery scene) for **John Jardine**. Then the clip records **C. J. Pommer Fuel Company** (cement delivery at 215 Water Street, N. W. corner of Mill Street and Division Street), **Atkinson's Federated Store** (visiting salesman sequence) , **Godfrey Studebaker-Packard Auto and Oil Company** (action sequence at 111 W. Union Street), **Waupaca Floral Company** (inside and outside gardens and delivery sequence at 340 W. Fulton Street).

Capitalizing on marvelous street scenes, next is **Fullerton Lumber Company** (lumber truck delivery sequence on Shearer Street), **Fisher and Falgatter Milling Company** at Oborn Street), **Waupaca Brick Yard** (operating scenes with buildings, equipment, trucks, train cars, brick stacking, furnaces, brick making, etc.), **Milius Motor Sales-Ford Garage** (mechanics caring for cars at 111 Jefferson Street), **Arcade Tavern** (N. side of Fulton Street), **Allen's Restaurant** (lots of diners going in – coming out at 107 W. Fulton Street), **Winter's Tavern** (106 N. Main Street), **Bammel's Funeral Home** (E side of Division Street), and the **Delevan Hotel** (S.E. corner of Main & Union Street.)

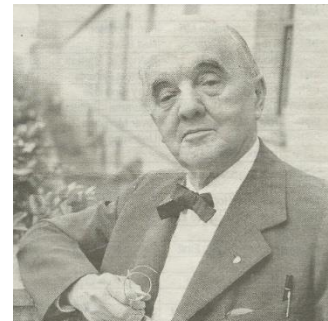
### Comments from the preface

*In the summer of 2010 the Waupaca County Post initiated a weekly Prime Time Supplement of about ten pages. Over 19 months, most of the supplement was a seven day television program schedule, but it also contained on the front page a history article (totaling to 73 articles). The Post opened its doors, inviting the Waupaca County Historical Societies, its own staff, and most everyone else, to submit history articles. Writers from many communities submitted an article and waited their turn to see it appear in the Prime Time. For example, New London submitted a dozen stories, telling about the history of buildings in their Heritage Village as well as about other landmarks. The Post also incorporated many of the stories of such Waupaca historians as Wayne A. Guyant. The articles, with content length constrained to about two regular pages and a photograph, offer a succinct account of their topic. They are history “in a nut shell”. A scan of the article index reveals that the compiler collected all the articles, arranged them in this community-based format, and created a “book” that contains a wealth of historical information.*

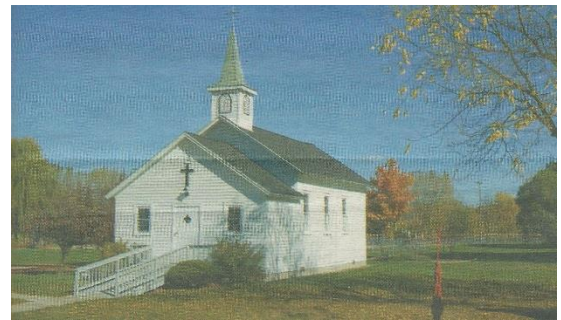

## Comments in the Preface

*This document compiled by Gerald E. Chappell was created by the Waupaca Historical Society to provide easy access to historic information for interested history researchers and residents of the Waupaca area. Sixty-four articles on historic events in the Waupaca area, which are drawn from the Waupaca Historical Society's newsletter, *The Reporter*, are coupled together from Volume 3 of 1999 through Volume 17 of 2013. There are 24 topics in alphabetical order with at least one article per topic. Not all issues contained a history article and records were not found for the issues of Volume I and II (which apparently were the initiating years 1997 and 1998).*

In this document, the pages and page numbers are as they are in the newsletters. The number designations for a given topic indicate the topic position and/or depth within the document. 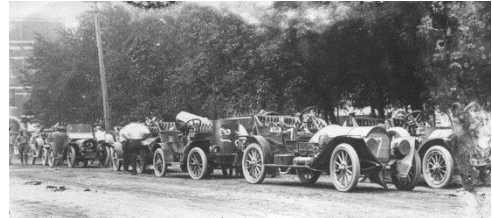
