MISSION CHURCH 1890

The early Catholics of Waupaca were without a church and some attended Mass at Lanark and at Manawa.

On March 30, 1890, the doors of St. Mary Magdalene were first opened by the Ignaus Chady, Wincell E. Chady, J. W. Heany, J. M. McGullough, Martin and the Congregation Church for \$1,000.
