December Christmas Event Returns to Waupaca

Many Waupaca residents fondly remember past Christmas events, including parades, visits from Santa and decorations along Main Street. And, thanks to several organizations and businesses in Waupaca, a holiday event will return in 2019.

The Yuletide Trail will take place on Saturday, Dec. 14 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in downtown Waupaca. The event is sponsored by the Waupaca Area Arts and Cultural Network, of which the Waupaca Historical Society is a part. Thanks to the help of numerous groups and individuals, residents and visitors alike are invited to come together to create a unique holiday experience that helps us celebrate, as a community, the upcoming holiday season!

The event will start with a holiday storytime and craft at the Holly History and Genealogy Center from 10 a.m. to noon. Librarians from the Waupaca Area Public Library will read seasonal stories on the half hour. Families are invited to the top floor of the Holly Center for this holiday fun!

People are also invited to purchase a collector's edition cookie tin for Waupaca's first-ever Community Cookie Walk! Tins will be available for purchase at the Holly Center before the event and on Dec. 14. On the day of the event, other downtown locations will also sell the tins. People can then fill their tins with cookies as they stop at participating downtown locations! All proceeds from the tin sales will go to Waupaca Historical Society's programs.

Other events happening on Dec. 14 are a kids' ornament project with glass beads at A Touch of Glass Studio and holiday caroling. The Waupaca Community Arts Board will be leading caroling up and down Main Street during the event. At 3 p.m., the carolers will



The summer season is over, and we are taking a break from the Depot open hours until the holiday season. A big thank you to all who have helped out this summer, whether you were giving tours, helping on the various projects at the Depot or mowing the lawn! Without our volunteers, we wouldn't be able to open the Depot doors as much as we do!

We will open the Depot again after Thanksgiving. Come out and visit us Thanksgiving weekend (Nov. 29-Dec. 1) from 12-5 p.m. We will also be open every Saturday in December from 12-5 p.m. The Depot will be decorated for Christmas and you might even spot some holiday model trains in the lower level! The Depot is a great place to bring visiting family and friends.

And, if you can't wait for Thanksgiving weekend, be sure to visit Virtual Railfan and watch the trains through our Depot cameras. You can watch the current video at <u>https://youtu.be/V6sYUkyJYFU</u>. The video highlights both directions of the Canadian National line through Waupaca. About 25 to 30 trains pass by the Waupaca Depot each day.

Even though we are now closed for tours, we have been busy with various events and rentals. In September, we hosted our annual meeting with a potluck and short meeting with our members-thank you to all that attended. In October, welcomed Waupaca we the Community Arts Board and their basket weaving class. The class was part of the 2019 Bach Festival. Also in October, the Badgers Den Brewing Club hosted their annual beer tasting event, which has been at the Depot the past several years.

Projects also still keep us busy at the Depot. Brian Godfrey helped trench in the wires for the street lights. They turned out very nice, and we have had many good comments about them. They really help light up the grounds and the trains for the Virtual Railfan cameras at night.

Brett Peterson got started on painting the outside of the Milwaukee Road caboose, so I have started doing the body work for it. Hopefully, if the weather cooperates, at least the east end and south side will be painted by the end of October.

Work on a Depot documentary is underway, with three video sessions already done. The film is funded by outside sources, so the Waupaca Historical Society is not financially supporting it and will not have ownership of it. Once completed, though, we will certainly sell copies of it at the Holly Center and the Depot. Ron Scott is behind the whole project and is the producer, and Max Hauser is doing the cinematography and co-producing. Max grew up in the Iola area and now lives in Appleton. They hope to complete the half-hour film by next spring. We will have to have a premier showing event when it is completed, so look for that in 2020!

A Look Back: The Opening of Indian Crossing Casino

For thousands of years, the Menominee Indians lived on the Chain O'Lakes and in the Waupaca area. Especially during the summer months, the Menominee would travel around the lakes, hunting, gathering and fishing. The pass between Columbia and Limekiln Lakes was one of the most frequented locations.

When the first white settlers came to Waupaca, a small bridge existed across the water between the two lakes. Through the years, this bridge has changed, but it has always been a busy spot for residents and visitors alike.


In July 1925, William R.

Arnold of Chicago built Indian Crossing Casino, taking its name from the bridge to its east. With Francis Steele as manager, Arnold created the Casino with a vision of establishing a dance hall that would attract both locally and nationally renown bands. John Martin bought the Casino in the 1930s and partnered with his son Al in 1937. Thanks to its location, Indian Crossing Casino was able to schedule big-name bands as they traveled between Minneapolis and Chicago. Bands that played the casino in the 1930s and 1940s included Glenn Miller, Louie Armstrong, Gypsy Rose Lee, Les Brown, Duke Ellington and Lionel Hampton.

In the 1950s the Casino hosted such bands as Woody Herman, Tommy Dorsey, and the Dukes of Dixieland. In the 1960s the Everly Brothers, Ricky Nelson, Bobby Vinton, Herman's Hermits and the Beach Boys performed at the Casino. Besides the large dance hall, the Casino had a large outdoor porch (built along Columbia Lake) that was popular during the warm summer months.

Today, Indian Crossing Casino again hosts concerts and serves food and drink.

The following article appeared in the *Waupaca County Post* on July 3, 1925 and was

INDIAN CROSSING CASINO, WAUPACA, WIS.

"The grand opening of the Indian Crossing Casino will take place on Saturday, July 4th, with a grand Fourth of July celebration which will start at 1:30, the program printed below to take place:

1:30 -- Junior Boys Swimming race.

- 1:40 -- Senior Boys Swimming race.
- 1:50 -- Ladies' Canoe race.

2:05 -- Ladies' Swimming race.

2:15 -- Boys Tub race.

Indian Crossing Casino opened in 1925 and served as a popular dance

2:30 -- Men's Swimming race.

2:40 -- Ladies' Fancy Diving contest.

"Prizes that are above the ordinary will be given for all events. A complete list of all the prizes can be found in the full page advertisement of the Casino, which is in this issue of the paper.

"The large and new dance hall and amusement park which was completed this week, has been erected at a cost of about \$30,000. The property is owned by Wm. R. Arnold of Chicago, and is under the direct management of Francis Steele, also a Chicago gentleman.

"The dance hall is 85×135 feet in size, and the contractors who had the job were Rasmus and Jenson of this city.

"Work was started on May 1st and on July 1st the construction work was entirely completed. The building is painted in white and tangerine orange.

"The pavilion is on the north shore of Indian Crossing and a dock and boat landing takes up the entire north side of the building. There are two 10 foot diving platforms, spring boards, water toboggan slides, etc. There are twentyfive row boats for renting purposes. Special electrical lighting effects have been arranged in the dance pavilion.

"In the hall there is also a completely equipped stage with special scenery. Parking space has been prepared to take care of four hundred cars, and there will be bus service between the Casino and the city at all times. There will be dancing on all holidays and every evening except Sunday.

"The orchestra that will furnish the music is the Arabian Knight Orchestra of Chicago. This is one of the orchestras that has been furnishing some of the radio concerts broadcasted by the large Chicago Hotels during the past winter.

"It is expected that a crowd of from 5,000 to 10,000 will attend the opening celebration on July 4th."

Collections Corner: Whispering Pines Park Postcard

The Waupaca Historical Society receives hundreds of artifact donations each year. These collections tell the story of the city of Waupaca, the Chain O'Lakes and the surrounding townships. This postcard (right) was donated by Mary Hlabon of Ogdensburg. The postcard is from Whispering Pines Park, previously situated on Marl Lake. Today, the State of Wisconsin owns the property, and it is a part of Hartman Creek State Park. The fountain shown was called "The Fountain of Youth" and showcased a statue of two children.

The Waupaca Historical Society presented a program on July 18, 2019 on Whispering Pines Park to a large crowd at the Holly Center. As a result of the program, numerous local residents have donated items related to Whispering Pines Park. The Jenswold family, which presented the program in July, have also donated several items from the park and have written a spiral-



Whispering Pines Park was the vision and work of Christ and Emma Hyldgaard. The couple purchased the property in 1929, planning to spend their summers along the lake. Before long, their retirement home turned into a park for visitors to enjoy for nearly 40 years.
