leadership and direction did much to keep Waupaca history alive!

#### Future

For display at the Holly Center, Director Julie Hintz is developing an exhibit featuring people, events and artifacts from the 60-year history of the society. The exhibit will run throughout the summer.

On Monday May 13th and Tuesday May 14th from 10 until noon, members of the Board of Directors and their spouses will engage in a Spring Cleaning Day at the Hutchinson House.

On Thursday, May 23rd, a large group of Home School students will tour the Hutchinson House.

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## \* Waupaca Historical Society 1964-94\*

### A history article by Jerry Chappell

An article on "The First Decade of the Waupaca Historical Society (WHS) -1953-1963" appeared in Volume 13, Issue 2, spring 2009, and pp. 1-3. Thus, in our 60th year of honoring those who have been keeping history alive, please go back to that article and review who the people were that originated our society. Now let's consider the people and events that stand out in the second, third and fourth decades, 1964-1994.

Picking up where the first decade was ending, the 1963 WHS officers were Allen Scott, president, replacing Alma Bridgeman; George Hill, vice president, succeeding Dr. Norman Jardine; and Mrs. Dagmar Nelson, secretary-treasurer, replacing Mrs. Ruth Raddiff.

Actually we ended decade one in 1967 with Miss Nita Benedict, serving as WHS President, coordinating the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration of the Hutchinson House (HH).

The sources of the history for this document are WHS Scrapbook II, as compiled by A. E. Sutton, Scrapbooks III (March 1989 - August 1992) and IV (September 1992 - December 1994) as compiled by Vera Duesterbeck, and the 1969-1994 minutes of the WHS meetings, which were first held in the Waupaca Public Library's Clubroom, then for most of the years in the Waupaca First Methodist Church. During the full 30 year period, the coordinating structure of WHS was predominantly in the hands of a "four officer executive group," and an HH curator, who seemingly served as an informal Board of Directors. Apparently, the full WHS membership was invited to attend the monthly WHS meetings wherein decisions were made by the consensus of those in attendance.

The WHSpresident's greeting and announcements were followed by a pledge of allegiance, an invocation, and the singing of several verses from "God Bless America."

Some years there was a Program Chairman who was responsible each month for the speaker selection and program presentation. Other years, various members took turns stepping up to schedule a speaker and program, often speaking themselves. Members also took turns as part of the Hospitality Committee, responsible for the Social Hour. Usually the secretary, treasurer and HH curator (e. g., conveying the number of visitors, amount of money and artifact donations, repair needs, and a plea for docent help) gave reports. In addition, during most years, the following standing committees also gave a report of their activities at each gathering during the business meeting: Accessions, Maintenance (usually Don Duesterbeck with helpers), and at the proper time of the year, Nominating. Victorian artifacts were continuously donated throughout the three decades. Each year there was an annual volunteer HH cleaning.

### 1969-84

The minutes of 1969-71, show that the WHSofficers for those years were Phillip B. Truesdell, president; Miss Marietta Stadler, vice president (replaced by Mrs. Verna Jensen '71); Alma Bridgeman, secretary-treasurer; and Nita Benedict, HH curator.

Members volunteered to assist with activities in the HH. The 1969-71 programs included "The Songs and Music of Pioneer Days," "The History of Lakeside Cemetery," "Memories of Rural Churches in the Waupaca Area," "History of the Children's' Home (on the present Bethany Home site)," "Potato Growing & Marketing in the Waupaca Area – Past and Present," "The Building of the Covered Bridge on Don Schmidt's Red Mill Property," "The History of the Arnold Brewery", "Paul Pope's Paleo Indian Spearheads," and "The

In 1971 the new office of Secretary, separating it from treasurer, was created with Vera Duesterbeck assuming the office. Mr. John Holzman became the HH Ourator. During 1972, the elected officers were: Don Duesterbeck, president; Phillip Truesdell, vice president; Mrs. Duesterbeck, secretary; and Verna Jensen, treasurer.

In 1973 a Taping Committee started interviewing older citizens of the community and recording their experiences and insights. In turn, an Essay Contest Committee

initiated/sponsored a high school Wisconsin history essay competition that continued throughout many of the years. Savings and checking accounts of WHS were started at local banks. Display cases were built by Don Duesterbeck.

The '73 and '74 programs included "The Spanish American War," "Homecoming 1913," " Granny's Quilts," "The History of Cranberries in the Waupaca Area," "The History of the Dane House," " Famous People of Wisconsin," "The History, Life, and Traditions of American Indians," "The Bicentennial Of, By, and For the People,"" Postal Service in Wisconsin," "The Growth of the Waupaca Police Department," " Buttons Through History," "Yesterday's Housekeeping," and "The History of the Foundry." In addition, WHS hosted a "Lost Arts Day."

In 1974 John Holzman consented to take over the presidency of WHS and Charlotte Nolan replaced him as curator of HH. WHS was pleased to receive word that HH was accepted as a State Registered Landmark (No 119) and saddened by the deaths of pioneer contributors Allen Scott, Tom E Browne, Sophelia Kurkowski, Alma Bridgeman, and Philip B. Truesdell.

In 1975, the WHS officers (John Holzman, president; Carmen Barnes, vice president; Josephine Rowlands, secretary; and Verna Jensen, treasurer) contended with the preparation for Waupaca's part in the

1976 National Bicentennial by creating many new committees. Included were a Book Committee to develop the "Our Heritage" book for the bicentennial, a committee to plan for hosting the North Central Regional Historic Convention, a Building Procurement and Funding Committee (chaired by Isabel Salan) to add an addition to HH, a Historic Stes and Markers Committee (research done by Dr. and Mrs. McGinnis) to identify over 18 historic Waupaca sites (Don and Vera Duesterbeck created, lettered, and painted the plaques.). Some years there were also committees for Program, Accessions, Taping and Family History, Membership, Essay Contest, Hospitality and Lunch Coordinating, Scrapbook, and Lost Arts.

Included in the historic sites were Baxter School, Danes Home/Hall, Episcopal Church, Mead Bank, Old Library Ste, Baptist Church, Browne Law Office, Danish Methodist Church, Evans Woolen Mill, Holy Ghost Evangelical Church, United Methodist Church, Old Tannery, Seventh Day Adventist Church, Trinity Lutheran Church, The Fisher-Fallgatter Mill, and the Shearer-Christy House.



During 1975, WHS also acquired the Heritage House from the veterans' complex at King for \$250. A basement was dug, a foundation laid, and the building was moved into place beside HH.

In 1976 the new officers were Reverend George Warren, president and Mrs. Alfred Nelson, vice president. Josephine Rowlands continued as secretary and Verna Jensen as treasurer. A Time Capsule was buried in the HH lawn. Throughout a number of the later years, WHS sponsored a 4<sup>th</sup> grade Wisconsin History Essay Writing Contest and the winners were invited to read their essays at WHS meetings.

In 1977, the officers remained the same except Wayne Guyant became vice president and Mrs. Guyant took over as program chairman. A porch was added to the Heritage House and 130 wooden plaques were completed by the Duesterbecks for wall memorials of pioneer Waupaca families. Don Duesterbeck also took care of all repairs needed around the two buildings.

In the 1978-'81 period, Mary Nelson as president was replaced by Father Edward Webster; Carman Barnes as vice president was replaced by Dr. McGinnis; Vera Duesterbeck as secretary was replaced by Mrs. Frank Lueders and then Robert Rauch; while Verna Jensen remained treasurer. Linda Cross became curator and wrote a column, "From the Curator's Corner," for the Wawpace Past that nicely kept the community informed about many aspects of HH. The presentations included "Yarns of Yesteryear," " 50 Years of Railroading," "World of Coins," "A History of Newport Rhode Island," and "The Early History of Halloween." A telephone was acquired, WHSentered an association with the Waupaca County Historical Society, a Memorial and Sunshine (or Cheer) Committee was created, WHScelebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a pot luck party at the Red Mill, 4<sup>th</sup> Graders commenced to tour HH, and the inside of HH was painted for \$550.

In the 1982-83 period the president was Dr. H. J. McGinnis; vice president Evelyn Doerr; secretary Louise Sutton; treasurer Vera Duesterbeck; and curator Linda Cross. The programs included "Excerpts From George Washington's Life," "The History of the Pinkerton Family," "The History of the American Red Cross," "The Granite Quarry," "The Great Depression, " "The Mead Murder Case," "Life of Benjamin Franklin," " The Life and Inventions of Thomas A. Edison," " The History of New England Gravestones," "Danish History in the Waupaca Area," " The History of the Waupaca Historical Society," " Heritage Hill," " and "The Silver Fox Industry."

In 1984 Evelyn Doerr served as WHS president; John Holzman as vice president; Louise Sutton as secretary; Vera Duesterbeck as treasurer; and Carmen Barnes as curator and Zilpha Davis as assistant curator. Some high school students who helped guide the 437 individuals that visited HH during 1983 continued helping. WHS received \$1000 from the city for upkeep of HH and the first listing of financial donations from the community totaled \$1835.

The 1984 program presentations included "Irish Songs," "The Life of Thomas Jefferson," "The Dane House," and "Marine Hospitals in the U.S." That year there was also a two session panel presentation and interaction on "Which Ethnic Group Contributed Most to Our Early Waupaca History".

Among others receiving awards for service over the years, Don and Vera Duesterbeck were awarded for their work at Hutchinson House and as tour guides and for Don's repair work on the two buildings.

1985-94

The WHS mission during the fourth decade seemingly was twofold: a) over ten years of monthly meetings, WHS offered over 60 speakers/ presentations that reviewed history. And b) they also kept Waupaca history alive by doing so within a vital Hutchinson House Museum and associated endeavors:

outstanding contributions in the collection, preservation, and dissemination of Waupaca and Wisconsin history) from a special committee representing the State Historical Society Board of Curators.

1987 "Marketing Waupaca History," "Early Medical Care and Nursing in Wisconsin," "The Holly Family History of Undertaking in Waupaca," "The History of Law and Order in Waupaca," "The Sheet Metal Business,"" History of Waupaca Apple Orchards," "A New France in our Midwest- Early History of Detroit," "Forming the Constitution of the United States," "The Spanish American War, " " Centennial Celebration at King," " First Thanksgiving," and "Christmas at Mount Vernon 1783."

Within a close-knit active membership of about 25, over the decade of 1985 through 1994, the life of WHS was in the hands of five presidents, five vice presidents, two secretaries, one treasurer, five curators (and a number of assistants), and a few sporadic program chairpersons.

**Presidents:** Evelyn Doerr '85, '86; John Holzman '87; Dr. H. J. McGinnis '88; Steve Nieland '89; Father Webster '90, '91, '92, '93; Don Duesterbeck '94.

Vice Presidents: John Holzman '85, '86; Isabel Salan '88, '89, '90; Steve Nieland '91, '92; Gill Hill '93, Don Clayton '94.

Secretaries: Louise Sutton '85, '86, '87, '88, '89; Don Duesterbeck '90, '91, '92, '93,'94.

Treasurers: Vera Duesterbeck '85, '86 '87, '88, '89, '90, '91, '92, '93, '94.

**Qurators:** Linda Cross '85, '86 (assistants, Mary Nelson and Zilpha Davis '85, '86); Mary Nelson '87. '88, '89, '90, '91 (Assistants Francine Gies '88, '89 and Steve and LaDonna Nieland '89); **Qusan Porfilio** '92, '93; Linda Pope '94.

#### Additional Activities over the 1985-94 period

During most of the 85-94 years WHS participated in the Pioneer Craft Show/Festival at the Armory, the Strawberry Festival, the Fourth of July Parade, and the Fall O Rama. They also held an annual picnic, usually at the Riverside or South Park. Over the decade, member and guest attendance ranged from 10 to 25.

WHS installed a bathroom in HH and bought an insurance policy in '86 and hosted a "Historical Workshop" at Trinity Lutheran Church in '87.

WHSgot a donation from the city of \$1, 500 and gave Mary Nelson \$300 as HH curator in '88.

The treasurer's report reached \$5116, WHShad a display at the New London Museum, and the painting was completed at the HH in '91.

Taking over as curator for 92, which was the 35<sup>th</sup> birthday, Susan Porfilio kept the Waupaca community well informed about activities at the Hutchinson House Museum through a column in the Waupaca fost entitled "Hutchinson House Highlights." To quote from Susan, "If people get out to see Victorian artifacts like we have at Hutchinson House, they'll find it really makes history come alive."

WHShosted the State Historical Regional Convention and WHSheld "Victorian Mistletoe Dinners" at the Oakwood Restaurant in '92 and '93.

WHShad Joss Heating and Cooling install a system for \$3,700, the treasurer's balance reached \$11,000, and a request was made to the city for \$5,000 for salaries and \$2,000 for operating expenses in '94.

Somewhere along the way, WHSturned the Heritage House into a Research and Genealogy center.

Hutchinson House Highlights By SUSAN PORFILIO, Curator
